

The Eagle Mountain Railroad was constructed in 1947–1948 by the Kaiser Steel Corporation, and is owned today by Kaiser Ventures, Inc., of Ontario, California. The EMRR was built to haul iron ore 51 miles from Kaiser's Eagle Mountain Mine to an interchange with the Southern Pacific mainline at "Ferrum" (Latin for "iron"). The EMRR features grades as steep as 2.15 percent on its climb out of the Salton Trough. The railroad was last used in 1986 and remains dormant.
