

The Santa Fe Central Railway started as the Santa Fe Albuquerque & Pacific Railroad with grand plans to reach the west coast. The name was changed to SFC once the plans became more realistic, which was to connect the El Paso & Rock Island from Torrance to Santa Fe. The SFC was completed in 1903 and a few years later changed its name to New Mexico Central. In 1926, the AT&SF purchased the road and abandoned it in stages from 1928 to 1943. The SFC is east of the 10,000-foot Manzano and Sandia Mountains, where the western mountains end and the Great Plains begin.
